## **Introduction of Speaker**

David Berg preceded his introduction of the speaker, Pastor Susanne Blume, with his usual interjection of humorous stories: this time unique prayers of children. Our speaker is Executive Director of Lifeline Partnership, a part of First Trinity Lutheran Church's ministry, involving persons with developmental disabilities. Her career includes being a lawyer before entering the pastorate. She is a graduate of Antioch Law School and the Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary.

## **Presentation**

Pr. Blume began with a story from her beginning at Lifeline. The tradition of Lifeline has been for participants to present a skit of the Gospel for the day. She admitted to apprehension about this at first for a number of reasons. She quickly learned to never make assumptions. God continues to surprise us.

She distributed scripts for us to participate in a skit about Christmas, this one showing that the person we sometimes think knows the least, is actually the smartest. There are lots of surprises in the Christmas story.

Lifeline was founded in 1954 by Catherine Meyers who had two children who were then known as "mentally retarded." Her children were not welcome at regular Sunday School so she started her own program. At the time it was an interfaith program, beginning at another church, but then moved to First Trinity.

The vocabulary related to this population has changed over the years, but there are some key legal and diagnostic definers. In 1990 the Americans with Disabilities Act gave civil rights that prohibit discrimination and requires reasonable accommodation and ability to live as independently as possible. The ELCA has a Social Message (2010) on People Living with Disabilities. The basic tenet is that the church is diminished when not all of God's children are involved.

L'Arche is an international program, including one in D.C. that provides housing and services to persons with disabilities. L'Arche believes that those with disabilities should be central, not peripheral partners.

Pr. Blume approaches this ministry as a way to build community. Many participants are at the stage of life after their schooling, but before moving onto other life-focused endeavors. Food and art-work are activity focuses. Worship services are held bi-monthly, with the goal to move to monthly services. She showed photos of her installation service and other community activities. Dances are held three times a year, which draw up to a 100 people. These events allow for socializing beyond the group homes that many live in.

A grant from WELCA has allowed the development of a nutrition and cooking program. Participants are learning to prepare meals on their own, often for the first time. They are preparing a book of recipes. Many live quite sedentary lives, so active activities are planned, including a day at Nationals stadium, an outing to Baltimore's aquarium. Members participated in the Help the Homeless Walkathon. Members from Trinity Arms, First Trinity's transitional program, were also invited to the Harvest Fest.

"Typical" is the preferred replacement for "normal." The Washington Interfaith Network (WIN) is assisting with advocacy in job-development, helping employers look at ability, not disability.

Pr. Blume asked us to survey our own congregations to see how inclusive we are, she invited people to volunteer at Lifeline's activities. She encouraged people to think of evangelism with this group. There is a website and newsletter, as well as a Facebook page. She is looking for entrepreneurs who can help change the culture and help Lifeline develop job opportunities.

Pr. Blume's first law school work involved working on disabilities rights. Her seminary internship involved working with persons with disabilities. She had not been aware of Lifeline, but feels that this is one of God's surprises in her life, and where she is called to be.

John Priebe invited contributions to support this program.

Chaplain Schmidt engaged us in a dismissal "surprise" – a conga-line dance to "We are dancing/marching in the Light of Christ."
